Biographical Note

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King was the principal leader of the U.S. Civil Rights movement in the 1950s and 1960s. He was born in 1929 in Atlanta, Georgia, educated at Morehouse and received his doctor of theology from Boston University. King was a Baptist minister who espoused nonviolence and peaceful protest. King founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and was the main face and voice of the movement until he was assassinated outside the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee April 4 of 1968.

Scope & Content

Collection of clippings from Chicago newspapers from the days following King's assassination. Dates range from April 5 to 10, 1968 Newspapers represented by the clippings include *Chicago Daily News, Chicago Daily Defender, Chicago Sun-Times, Chicago's American* and *Southeast Economist*.
